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Kevin's Corner

Home Rule? For over a decade, the impact of decisions made at the State level have made it nearly (if not completely) impossible for new cities to be formed across the State. With nearly 500 cities already in existence within California, an argument can be made that Californians don't need more layers of bureaucracies to prosper, and that perhaps maybe our rapidly growing unincorporated (noncity) communities should instead look to annexation into a nearby city. Warning! Make no mistake that just the mere thought of annexing causes hair to stand straight up on the back of the neck for some residents. The emotions of annexation run so deep that it's like a declaration of war! So why would I even mention this polarizing issue? Well.... we have several unincorporated communities in our County that are continuing to grow very rapidly (and in some cases have already passed up the populations of numerous existing cities), and in my opinion, County government sometimes struggles to provide clear and/or adequate vision, planning, infrastructure, and daily services. Residents within cities have an entire city council, and a City Manager and staff that focus on making sure their city residents and services are being addressed. In the unincorporated county communities, they have one elected County Supervisor who represents about 500,000 total citizens, who is only one of five representatives for the County as a whole, including the 80% of residents who live in a city. If the County Supervisor (and his/her staff) is not deeply engaged in every unincorporated community, "things" can fall through the cracks or are simply forgotten or ignored by the bureaucracy. I don't have any easy answers here. Each of our large unincorporated communities have their own unique needs and economic opportunities (and often STRONG opinions about being absorbed by their neighboring cities!). Honest discussions and evaluations need to come from the communities themselves – not necessarily from the top down.

Congestion and Taxes. I have made mention in the recent past of a possible new sales tax being proposed by the Riverside County Transportation Commission (RCTC). RCTC is a separate stand-alone government agency that has a representative (city council member) from every city in the county, plus all five county supervisors. In my humble opinion, the RCTC has been forced to do the former job of Cal-Trans (a State organization), that used to be the national leader in planning, developing, and constructing our highways and freeways. The State has reduced Cal-Trans to a simple maintenance and repair mission and has left the heavy lifting of providing new and expanded transportation infrastructure to local governments to fund and figure out (or not). When former Gov. Jerry Brown was first elected Governor (1975), I recall that he had a philosophy that if we (the State) did NOT build a modern transportation network – they (the population masses) would not come. **(Continued on Page 2)**

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The masses clearly missed the memo. Fast forward to today where a similar "do not build it" thought process is now in place with the hopes that those who do move here will instead walk, ride a bike, or take a bus or train to work. While some will, the vast majority don't, won't or can't. Hence our freeway parking lots. Likely in June, the RCTC commission is going to be asked to put on the November ballot a NEW sales tax proposal to help fund and build all the freeway / highway / roadway improvements that are contained in a massive plan for our county. I have my own personal positions about new taxes and long-term debt being handed down to our children and grandchildren, but this future sales tax vote will be very personal for each of you to decide in November—because no one from our State government is coming to help. They just want us to add tens of thousand of new residents and homes to our County without any infrastructure funding to support them or us.

Help Your Firefighters! I bring this up regularly, but you can really help your firefighters help you (and your neighbors) by making sure you break out your weed-whacker and trim down those tall grasses/ weeds BEFORE they dry out this month and transition from fresh to fuel. It honestly makes a difference as to how fast or how far a fire can spread. Get 'er done!

Goodbye Willie. The vast majority of you will have no idea who Willie was, but Mrs. Willie Moses, age 102, passed away this past April 16. In short, she was a true mover and shaker. In 1946, she and her husband Henry moved to the rural community of Good Hope (between Perris & Lake Elsinore). Over many decades she successfully worked to have a local school, fire station, and community center built. She coordinated a free food program for low-income residents and helped seniors with services and programs. In 2008, the County named the local community center after her (and fellow longtime resident and Volunteer Firefighter John Schaffer). She was also a decades long member of the Municipal Advisory Council. Always polite, but always determined, she was engaged on behalf of her community up until the end – Willie will be missed. RIP.



Do you have one minute a month to help make Riverside County better? The County of Riverside is working with Flash Vote to gather valuable input from residents to inform decisions on programs, policies and budgets. The sign-up process takes less than one minute and the individual information collected by Flash Vote is never shared with the County, nor anyone else. When residents sign up, they can determine if they want to receive the surveys by email, text or phone. Residents will receive a notification whenever there is a new survey, and they will have 48 hours to participate before voting closes. Once a survey is closed, everyone who participated will automatically receive a summary of the overall results and be able to see how their responses compare to the group. Results are anonymous. 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First District Profile




Kevin Jeffries was elected in November 2012 to represent

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


Visit all RivCoParks for FREE with the RivCoParks Library Pass!

UNPERMITTED PALLAT YARD VOLUNTARILY REMOVED

Code Enforcement received reports of a pallet yard being operated out of a vacant parcel in Mead Valley. The pallet yard was approximately 1,200 square feet and consisted of wooden pallets, discarded wood pallets, discarded wood, stacks of pallets each measuring approximately 20 feet in height, and several wooden shade covering structures built throughout the property. With the property owner's cooperation and compliance, the property owner cleared the property of all illegal business activity.



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COMING SOON TO MEAD VALLEY!

Riverside County Supervisors recently granted final approval for Riverside University Health System's (RUHS) Wellness Village in Mead Valley, a ground-breaking project that will transform healthcare by seamlessly integrating behavioral health treatment with medical care and social services.

Slated for completion in 2026, the Village will feature a crisis residential behavioral health center for children and a Children's Mental Health Urgent Care - both a first in Riverside County. The facilities will address a critical gap in local healthcare services.

Construction of the \$580 million, 19.4-acre campus will begin in June at the intersection of Harvill Avenue and Placentia Avenue-an area with few other healthcare options.

In an effort to create a safe, comfortable, and legal alternative to illegal food vendors on dangerous street corners, the BOS also approved funding for a new Mead Valley Food Truck Marketplace, which will create a new outdoor food and vendor market near the corner of Harvill Avenue and Cajalco Road.
